WHEREAS, internet users and our information infrastructure face the persistent and growing threat of spyware, malware, and phishing cyber-attacks meant to deny access to computer systems, steal personal identities, compromise privacy, and reduce financial security; and

WHEREAS, Town staff and officials understand that Internet security is a shared responsibility in which everyone has a critical role for using care opening emails, providing information online, and fact checking important information; and

WHEREAS, raising awareness of cybersecurity in our community will help protect the Town's information infrastructure and our community; and
