Pedestrian safety continues to decline around the country, throughout North Carolina, and in Orange County. From 2019-2023, there were 189 pedestrian crashes in Orange County, ranking 11th worst of 100 N.C. Counties. Of these crashes, 18 resulted in

pedestrian fatalities (ranked 20th, previously 23rd) and 19 resulted in serious pedestrian injuries (23rd, previously 23rd). Dedicated efforts to influence motorist behavior on the high-injury roadway network are essential to creating a safer system and reducing the loss of human life in our community. Community education and outreach coupled with direct public engagement and public safety enforcement will improve broad community understanding about our shared responsibility in reversing these trends and building a safer transportation network for all road users.

The Town of Chapel Hill plans to continue the fight for safer roadways for all users by using the sixth year of the Governors Highway Safety Program (GHSP) grant funding. The work will be done by a full-time Vision Zero Coordinator and supported by a Pedestrian Safety Outreach Intern, while continuing extra-duty traffic enforcement efforts by the Chapel Hill Police Department (CHPD). Chapel Hill's road safety efforts have grown and evolved each year. To further expand the impact of our work we are proposing for the full-time Vision Zero Coordinator to expand data-driven infrastructure safety improvements in areas with demonstrated safety needs to maximize the impact of Town staff time and materials. This refocuses efforts along and connecting to the High-Injury-Network rather than all neighborhoods within the Town. The Vision Zero Coordinator will continue organizing and managing the Town's focus on pedestrian safety, and aggressively implement the Town's Vision Zero Work Plan in addition to completing GHSP grant requirements in a thorough and timely manner. The Pedestrian Safety Outreach Intern will continue to provide key support to extend outreach capacity in the Chapel Hill and University of North Carolina (UNC) communities. Together, these two positions, along with continued overtime enforcement from CHPD, will have expanded capacity to build on the progress that we have made in past grant cycles and better focus our efforts on the most effective solutions to our pedestrian and cyclist safety problems.

Dedicated work tasks for grant personnel include:

## - Data Analysis:

Continuing to evaluate and analyze crash data, and coordinating data collection between CHPD and UNC Police, is an important component of the Town's safe systems approach to pedestrian safety and to the long-term sustainability of this movement. As much as 20% of the Vision Zero Coordinator's and the Pedestrian Safety Outreach Intern's time is dedicated to collecting and updating pedestrian crash data, analyzing existing pedestrian crash data, creating reports and visualizations to share the data with stakeholders, and establishing patterns and risk predictions for high-risk street networks and intersections. These data tasks are critical for identifying issues, targeting outreach efforts, informing the Town's decisions and investments, and tracking progress towards our goals. The expanded role of the full-time Vision Zero Coordinator will allow us to explore new innovative approaches and technologies for collecting, analyzing, and sharing data and trends.

#### - Foster Inter-Agency Partnerships and Collaboration

Coordinating with various local partners and stakeholders to leverage efforts and create a Town-wide Vision Zero culture. A large portion of this task is the staffing of the Town's Vision Zero Task Force and working groups.

The Vision Zero Task Force has been meeting for five years and provides critical input and feedback on the implementation of the Town's Vision Zero Work Plan and continued pedestrian safety efforts and interventions. This Task Force has representatives from vulnerable and under served communities, transportation, transit, public health, police, youth services,

The Task Force holds monthly staff working group meetings comprising of Town staff groups and broader Task Force members. The full Task Force holds quarterly update meetings to implement the Vision Zero Work Plan strategies, focusing on equity, public engagement, and technical analysis. The Task Force is a critical group of committed community members and representatives who frequently assist with and participate in other Vision Zero events such as walk audits, traffic counts, public outreach, and conferences.

In FY26 the Task Force will expand its focus to include targeted outreach to residents located in Communities of Concern (CoC) and increase emphasis on pedestrian safety programming for youth and families. Communities of Concern include five populations: racial minority, elderly, low-income households, limited English proficiency (LEP) households and zero-car households. CoCs are represented as any geographic area, analyzed by census block group, where the percentage of a vulnerable or under-served population is greater than the Town-wide threshold for that population. For example, if 50 % of the Town's households have access to at least one car, any census block group with fewer than 50% of households having access to one car would be identified as a zero-car household Community of Concern.

This approach was adapted from the regional metropolitan planning organization (DCHC MPO) 2020 Environmental Justice Report and maps five overlapping communities of concern: racial minority (non-White) population, elderly population, low-income households, and zero-car households, and limited English proficiency (LEP) households.

One strategy is to bring roadway and pedestrian safety messaging to residents in Communities of Concern, following the Town's strategy to meet people where they are. The Town of Chapel Hill won a United States Conference of Mayors Obesity Challenge grant to start a "Wheels of Wellness" mobile bike block party. A new Town staff person will lead this work to promote cycling and active living to populations who have historically been underrepresented, overlooked, or excluded from Town activities. Vision Zero staff will support Wheels of Wellness events to conduct safety education and outreach, gather feedback about

transportation barriers, better understand gaps, and gain insight into unsafe incidents that are not reported to the police.

## - Community Outreach

The Town recognizes the importance of community engagement in driving broad community support and understanding of pedestrian and traffic safety initiatives. During the past five years, the Town conducted outreach activities in virtual, hybrid, and in-person formats. In year six, Chapel Hill will continue to be a leader in pedestrian safety outreach and will continue to share our experiences with statewide Vision Zero groups, transportation planning associations, and conferences. Finding and conducting innovative approaches to effective community engagement is a core element of our grant work and sharing what we learn and data we collect will help expand the impact and reach of the work. Engaging and educating the public at in-person workshops, walk audits, outreach campaigns, Town activities, and school/school district events will be an important part of the Town's year six implementation to broaden reach and engagement. The Town will continue to promote virtual engagement opportunities through a new Vision Zero Engagement HQ site, which offers touch points for community members unable or unwilling to attend in-person activities.

#### - Enforcement

During year six of the grant, enforcement efforts will remain a key component in improving pedestrian safety on high-risk corridors and intersections. Pedestrian and bicyclist fatalities and serious injuries continue to increase on the high-risk network; enforcement activities are targeted to reverse this trend. Vision Zero staff will work with the CHPD to evaluate the preceding year's enforcement efforts to inform continued high-impact, high-visibility enforcement. In analyzing the impact of the first five years of enforcement efforts, Town and CHPD recognized the value of having additional tools to inform these enforcement efforts, especially in times where PD staffing capacity is strained, so that law enforcement officers can have highest impact when conducting these operations. These tools include variable messaging signs and data collection devices. Crash data, GIS analysis, and safety countermeasures implemented during year five will inform enforcement activities in year six. Enforcement efforts will also concentrate around new highway safety design improvement areas as a mechanism to reinforce compliance with new traffic patterns and analyze effectiveness.

**Budget Justification** (Provide a detailed explanation of the costs associated with proposed project):

The GHSP Grant will fund:

- CHPD overtime pay:

This effort includes paying overtime for Chapel Hill off-duty officers to conduct enforcement activities using saturation patrols and other high visibility enforcement efforts. These will focus on key high-risk locations and the top three contributing circumstances to pedestrian crashes: speeding, inattention, and failure to yield. CHPD will schedule a minimum of 312 scheduled hours of overtime throughout the grant year in 4–6-hour shifts. To be reimbursed for funds spent on time and a half salary and benefits, the agency will submit a monthly schedule for overtime efforts and the monthly on-duty schedules of the officers who worked the overtime enforcement activities that month. The Chapel Hill Police Department agrees to submit copies of CAD reports that coincide with each officer's overtime shift, enforcement data, and copies of the citations issued during the overtime shift. Salary and fringe benefit information will be provided for all officers working the overtime enforcement activities.

Vision Zero Coordinator Salary:

This is a full-time position, including full Town benefits. The FY26 budget follows Town protocol for cost of living pay increase. Occasional market rate assessments and annual increases based on Town budget and performance assessments.

Pedestrian Safety Outreach Intern:

This is a part-time position, funded at 1000 hours over the course of the grant.

- Community Outreach and Education:

The Vision Zero Coordinator will purchase supplies for safety outreach campaigns, educational demonstration projects, traffic safety walk audits, and other events with community stakeholders. Supplies may include signage, tables, safety materials, educational activities, meals, and snacks. The Town will include agendas and sign-in sheets with reimbursement for meals, snacks, and supplies. The program will coordinate a semi-annual public education messaging campaign utilizing existing GHSP safety program messaging and messaging based on Chapel Hill's crash data trends with community organizations including but not limited to UNC, Chapel Hill Transit, and media partners.

- Demonstration Materials: (e.g. flexible delineator posts, armadillos, modular medians, low profile speed bumps)

These materials will be used to install mid-block crosswalks, bulb outs, neck downs, chicanes, turn hardening and other innovative road safety countermeasures to educate the public on their purpose and benefits. The materials will be used in coordination with the Towns traffic calming request process and Vision Zero website. The updated Traffic Calming Policy refocuses staff efforts toward data driven issues in areas of need. Areas of need are determined by a project prioritization tool that scores a project based on crash history, proximity to communities of concern, vehicle traffic volumes, documented operating
