Dear Mayor and Town Council Members,
The Chapel Hill-Carrboro NAACP branch believes that the Trinity Court and Jay Street Apartments developments provide sorely needed affordable housing in our town, which is crucial to maintaining a community that is racially and socio-economically diverse. However, our full support for these developments is contingent upon Town Council addressing our concerns.

We offer suggestions for both of these developments in order to ensure that they best serve the needs of future residents. Thank you for careful attention to the following requests:

We urge the Town to ensure that Orange County residents and people who are currently on the public housing waitlist be given priority for these apartments.

We ask that the Town Council ensure that the 99-year lease has enforceable provisions such that any developments during those 99 years remain affordable after the 30-year federal requirements for affordability lapse.

For both developments, we recommend that the Town Council consider the following:

1. Expand the hours of the bus routes that serve these developments, so that workers who are working late shifts are able to use public transit to and from the apartments.
2. The residents who live there should be empowered and have a voice in the management of the property and decisions that affect their lives. It is vital that transparent processes exist that allow residents to provide meaningful feedback to management without fear of retaliation. If residents are organizing outside of the processes controlled by management for the purpose of improving conditions where they live, those gatherings should be allowed and should never be the basis for retaliation.
3. Town staff should be vigilant and responsive to any claims of retaliation against residents. The Town's lawyers should ensure that these rights of residents are clearly laid out in agreements with the managing companies. These affordable housing developments are taxpayer-funded and therefore the same principles of transparency and responsiveness to constituents (specifically residents) should apply.

For Jay Street Apartments, we echo the advice given by the Transportation and Connectivity Advisory Board that the Town should work with the developer to ensure that proper ADA access is installed so that people with mobility challenges can safely travel to the nearby bus stops. Sidewalks should connect to the nearby bus stop and those bus stops should have a level platform where a person in a wheelchair can safely wait for the bus. Currently, there is no sidewalk, and there is not a level platform for waiting transit users. A person in a wheelchair would need to travel in the roadway, navigating around cars, and then wait in the street, which is obviously unsafe.

For Trinity Court, we again wish to reiterate the importance of ensuring that people in wheelchairs are able to safely leave the property. The slope of the driveway to the property is too steep for a person in a wheelchair to be able to navigate it. While paratransit is an important service, it is not always convenient and is sometimes limiting. The Transportation and Connectivity Advisory Board recommended that management of the apartments operate low speed vehicles for shuttling people to and from the nearby bus stops. We urge the Town to work with the management of the apartments to ensure that such a solution is implemented in the future.

These two developments can provide much needed affordable housing in our town. We look forward to continuing to work with the Town Council and staff to ensure that they are well-designed and well-managed. We look forward to the Town Council's written response to our concerns.

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Mrs. Viñas,

Thank you for the update and for the expanded description of SOHRAD's approach and how they are engaging the long term camper on the site. I definitely appreciate the need to establish rapport and trust with the resident at the encampment, and the approach you described makes a lot of sense to me.

That said, I am concerned with your statement that the encampment is outside the area planned to be developed. I expect that Community Home Trust and Taft-Mills Group will seek to have the encampment removed once the land is leased to them, regardless of it being outside of the development area itself. I know I and others have asked that the Jay Street Parcel be subdivided, so that only the developed portion would be leased to Community Home Trust and Taft-Mills Group; however, it is my understanding from the recent Joint Advisory Board meetings that the entire parcel is still being put forward for the Conditional Zoning and Lease. Has there been any change in direction on how much of the land will be rezoned and leased to CHT and Taft-Mills Group?

One last point of concern. In the January Public Information Session where I raised the long term camper's encampment to your attention, you stated that you were unaware of the encampment or its residents. As I stated on that call, I realized that they were on the Jay Street Parcel by noting that the survey markings from December went down to the area of their encampment. So most certainly the Summit Survey Team took note of this, and if Dustin Mills or anyone from Taft-Mills Group visited the site, they would have noticed this too. Now I recognize that neither Summit nor Taft-Mills work for you and the Town directly; but I would have thought they would have conveyed the presence of the encampment to Community Home Trust. Which means either they did not bother to disclose this to Community Home Trust, or Community Home Trust did not bother to disclose this to you and the Town, or to SOHRAD. I and others in my neighborhood have raised concerns with the developer, especially how they have treated us, since our first engagement with them in March. I have been given very little reason to trust Dustin Mills -- or Summit Engineering or Community Home Trust for that matter -- and this is one more situation where the developer's actions have further weakened what little trust I have in them and the integrity of this project. I continue to see warning signs, like this one; yet the Town continues to move forward with this long time Republican from eastern North Carolina. Perhaps you have a different perspective on why no one else raised the concern of the long term camper's residence on the site, and I would be interested in hearing it if you do. I do try and give people the benefit of the doubt, but because of the way this project has been handled, I find I am left with little trust and tremendous doubt.

Mr. Beasley,

Thanks for your follow up and interest on this issue. Yes, we have been working with the Orange County Partnership to End Homelessness and Orange County's Street Outreach, Harm Reduction and Deflection Program (SOHRAD). SOHRAD staff are aware of the long-time camper on the site and have been building trust with her over the last few months. SOHRAD starts by building rapport, seeing if the person needs any supplies like sleeping bags or personal care supplies while getting a sense of other supports someone may have and the barriers there may be to finding housing. They work towards enrolling a community member into the program and developing a permanent housing plan with them (this can happen as quickly as a first encounter if the person is open and it may take 10 or 20 times depending on the level of trust that the person has).

While this encampment is outside of the area planned to be developed, we will continue to coordinate with the SOHRAD team to provide the resources needed to explore options for finding permanent, stable housing solutions. Thanks for your continued interest in this issue.
