WHEREAS, the Town of Chapel Hill and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill are committed to fostering communities where all people have an opportunity to thrive, a community that is welcoming to all, a community that promotes safety, equity, fairness, respect, adherence to law and policy, and a community that supports cooperative approaches to problem solving: and

WHEREAS, disagreements, conflicts, complaints, confusion, frustrations, and questions will inevitably arise in our respective organizations and interdependent communities; and

WHEREAS, the early identification, fair consideration, and equitable handling of such issues is in the best interests of individual community members, the Town of Chapel Hill and/or University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill; and

WHEREAS, nationally renowned Ombuds offices have been established in the Town of Chapel Hill and at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, to provide highly valued services to the Town and the University, respectively, by helping individuals fully understand, articulate, and frame their stories; by helping to identify options, strategies and resources for responses to challenging circumstances; by helping individuals and communities engage to develop constructive paths forward; and by providing insights and information to decisions makers so they may make better decisions; and

WHEREAS, these Ombuds offices have served thousands honorably and compassionately in their respective missions by aligning their work with the Town of Chapel Hill's values of responsibility, equity, safety, professionalism, ethics, communication, and teamwork, and with the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill's principles of being of the public, for the public, innovative, and above all, human and humane;
