WHEREAS, because April is for the Earth in Chapel Hill, providing an opportunity for everyone to engage in efforts – beig or small – to help improve our local ecosystems; and

WHEREAS, everyone in Chapel Hill can make a difference for the monarch by planting native milkweed and nectar plants to provide habitat for the monarch and pollinators in locations where people live, work, learn, play and worship; and
