Margaret's Story

Margaret knew the refrigerator was empty.

She opened it anyway to check because she hated listening to her kids' bellies rumble when she tucked them in at night. This wouldn't be the first time they went to bed hungry.

Margaret left a housekeeping job to study early childhood education at Durham Tech. She now works in that field and is taking steps to start her own business, but she still struggles to meet her family's needs. As a Food Pantry member, Margaret receives groceries monthly, which allows her to stretch her funds to cover necessities like school supplies and car repairs.

Hunger is not unique to Margaret's story. It's not even unusual in our community. One in seven Orange County residents – including almost one in five children – is food insecure. We need to do more, but IFC's ability to feed hungry families is limited by the challenges of running programs in two aging buildings located one mile apart.

"We try very hard to maximize volunteers' efforts," said Bill Culton, Community Kitchen Manager, "but sometimes we can't fit everybody in the group in the Kitchen." At the Food Pantry, volunteers resort to storing and retrieving donated food from staff offices and back hallways.

Our primary concern, though, is that offering services in two locations burdens individuals and families who are already struggling. We don't feel good about asking a cash-strapped mom with hungry kids in tow to shuttle between two towns so she can access resources to care for her family.

Together, we are IFC. With your investment in FoodFirst, we can create one dignified, accessible space to feed every hungry person who walks through our doors.





Our neighbors go hungry

One out of seven

Orange County residents is food insecure and at risk of hunger.



Hunger is a daily issue for too many children, families and individuals of all ages.

The stress of food insecurity lines our neighbors' faces every day. People wait in line for an open chair at the Community Kitchen, which seats 48 diners at a time and serves more than 39,000 free meals a year. Food Pantry volunteers send home than 13,000 bags of groceries every year.

A BEST PRACTICE FOOD PANTRY. A member-choice pantry recognizes everyone's dignity by inviting members to select food items most useful for their families.

A BIGGER COMMUNITY KITCHEN. The new kitchen will seat 64 people at a time, a significant increase over the current inadequate kitchen and dining area.

WELCOMING COMMUNITY SPACE. Co-located services support individuals and families experiencing poverty or unexpected changes in their financial situation.
