AMENDMENT REQUEST	DATE
<p>Amend Chapter 21 of the Chapel Hill Code of Ordinances to change the Town-wide default speed limit to 25 mph, establish school zones, create a process to establish Neighborhood Slow Zones, and prohibit dooring. The text amendments are part of a broader package of Vision Zero amendments to the Town Code of Ordinances. The text amendments would:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Simplify Speed Limit Code and signal the Town’s commitment to safe speeds, consistent with the Vision Zero Resolution passed by Town Council on October 13, 2021 that establishes a commitment to prioritizing the safety of vulnerable road users; • Establish school zones at all Chapel Hill-Carrboro City Schools in Chapel Hill jurisdiction and set a 20 mph speed limit for those on Chapel Hill-owned roads, • Authorize Neighborhood Slow Zones, community-driven traffic calming measures to improve safety for vulnerable road users, • Add a dooring ordinance to the Town Code of Ordinances, which would prohibit the improper opening of a vehicle door to endanger moving traffic, including vehicles, bicycles and pedestrians. That the Council provide feedback on the proposed Code of Ordinances text amendments, receive public comment, and consider adoption on May 4, 2022.

DECISION POINTS

Tonight’s proposal is to amend the Traffic Code (Chapter 21) of the Chapel Hill Code of Ordinances to include the following changes:

- Amend Section 21-11, Speed Regulations, to standardize a Town-wide speed limit of 25-mph, establish new school zones, and authorize Neighborhood Slow Zones.
- Amend Section 21-10, One-way streets, and Sec. 21-63-64, Reserved, to create a new article for schedules of designated street regulations
- Amend Section 21-20, Interference with traffic, to include a provision on dooring.



TECHNICAL REPORT: PEDESTRIAN AND BICYCLIST SAFETY

The following is a summary of the proposed text amendments that would amend the Chapel Hill Code of Ordinances in accordance with Vision Zero goals:

1. Amend Section 21-11, Speed Regulations, to standardize a Town-wide speed limit of 25 mph, establish new school zones, and authorize neighborhood slow zones.

This amendment would eliminate the need to identify each street with a speed limit of 25 MPH. This amendment would not change the speed limits on any streets. This would bring the Code up to date with the Town's standard operating procedures.

This amendment would establish school zones speed limits at all public schools in Chapel Hill, which would lower speed limits to 20 MPH on Town-owned roads during corresponding hours.

This amendment would authorize Neighborhood Slow Zones as a feasible traffic calming mechanism. Neighborhood Slow Zones are a community-driven approach to achieving safe speeds on neighborhood streets in line with Vision Zero goals. This amendment would not establish any Neighborhood Slow Zones, but would provide a process for establishment.

2. Amend Section 21-10, One-way streets, and Sec. 21-63-64, Reserved, to create a new article for schedules of designated street regulations

This amendment would establish a new article in the Code of Ordinances for schedules of street regulations. One-way streets are currently listed under Article II, Traffic Control Devices. This would establish a new Article VII with a schedule for Neighborhood Slow Zone designation, should they be made into permanent speed changes.

3. Amend Section 21-20, Interference with traffic, to include a provision on dooring.

This amendment would make it unlawful for an operator of a vehicle to unsafely open the door of their vehicle and create a harmful situation for other road users.
