Thank you for your email regarding the Greene Tract. The County has established a web page with additional information on the proposed changes to the area that includes the Greene Tract and the County-owned Headwaters preserve.

The 2002 agreement called for preserving 85.4 acres of the original 104-acre parcel. With the additional 60 acres (Headwaters Preserve) added to this parcel, plus the 22 acres of land dedicated for conservation and four acres for recreational use, the revised agreement will preserve a minimum of 86 acres. Open space is also anticipated to also be interspersed within the areas suggested for future development, as is the norm in Chapel Hill, Carrboro, and Orange County.

Preserving our county's natural spaces is a priority for the Orange County Board of Commissioners. We have invested in conservation easements throughout the county. In conjunction with Chapel Hill and Carrboro, we created the Rural Buffer in 1988, a joint planning and zoning area that encourages very low-density residential development and promotes agricultural uses.

Providing more opportunities for affordable housing is also a priority for the Board of Commissioners. Orange County has one of the worst income disparities of any county in the state, and there is a desperate need for more affordable housing in our community. All the elected boards have made this one of their highest priorities. Many residents understand the need and overwhelmingly approved a \$5 million affordable housing bond in 2016 (65.6% approval).

Costs to provide affordable housing in Orange County are high. Costs can be lessened by using county or town-owned property like the Greene Tract/Headwaters Preserve. In addition, in order to effectively support the residents of affordable housing, it is vital that it have access to essential housing related services like water and sewer, transit, schools, recreation, and economic opportunities. The Greene Tract scores high on all these metrics.

Dear Mayor and Town Council Members,

Thank you for agreeing to meet this evening for a special session to discuss and determine the fate of the Greene Tract.

The Greene Tract is one of the few spaces left in Chapel Hill that is untouched and has the ability to be partially protected from development. The community-at-large regularly uses this special place for recreation, and if it is voted on to be developed per Option A, then it will be gone. Reducing the amount of recreational space available to the residents would be an unfortunate choice, especially considering the continued development along Homestead and Eubanks Roads. Residents of Chapel Hill choose to live here because of the quality of life and opportunity to easily access green space for recreational use, and Option A significantly reduces what is available.

It is indisputable that the Chapel Hill-Carrboro area needs more affordable housing options, and I fully support building what is desired by and suggested in the RENA report. However, it is still the town's responsibility to build affordable housing in locations that will best serve the future residents (i.e. access to grocery stores, bus lines, economic interests), and it is very concerning that the new plan has ramped the housing/mixed use from 18.1 acres, which was part of the 2002 plan, to 45 acres.

Additionally, it is significant to note Chapel Hill-Carrboro City Schools will need 20, not 11 acres, for school development, per the May 2019 letter. Therefore, the proposed plan would really be dropping the 145 acres of land originally labeled for preservation down to more like 80 acres, at best.

These estimates also do not include acreage needed to gain access or additional entrances to the area. If a large affordable housing community is constructed, they will need road widening and additional infrastructure to meet the demands of the new residents. A school or housing build on the eastern edge next to the railroad tracks would need major street development to gain entrance.

As development decisions are made, it is crucial to do an environmental impact study to learn how the sensitive headwaters and preserve will be affected, as well as how the required infrastructure and access to the areas will affect the area, including the proposed development acreage.

Once this space is developed, it can not be reclaimed, so I am hopeful that you will make the logical decision to vote in favor of Option B. Thank you for your service to our community.

Council Members,

I encourage you to reject both Greene tract resolutions. The original resolution shows about 50% development of that tract, far from the 20% that has been discussed for years. The alternative resolution does no better at ensuring an 80/20 split of preservation and development.

In reality, the best use of that land is as 100% open space. The disposition of that land is not a Rogers Road neighborhood issue, it's an issue of great interest to the whole town. A healthy town needs open space, and Chapel Hill is woefully lacking. We depend on the Horace Williams tract now for outdoor recreation, but that property is under development agreement and will not be available for long.
