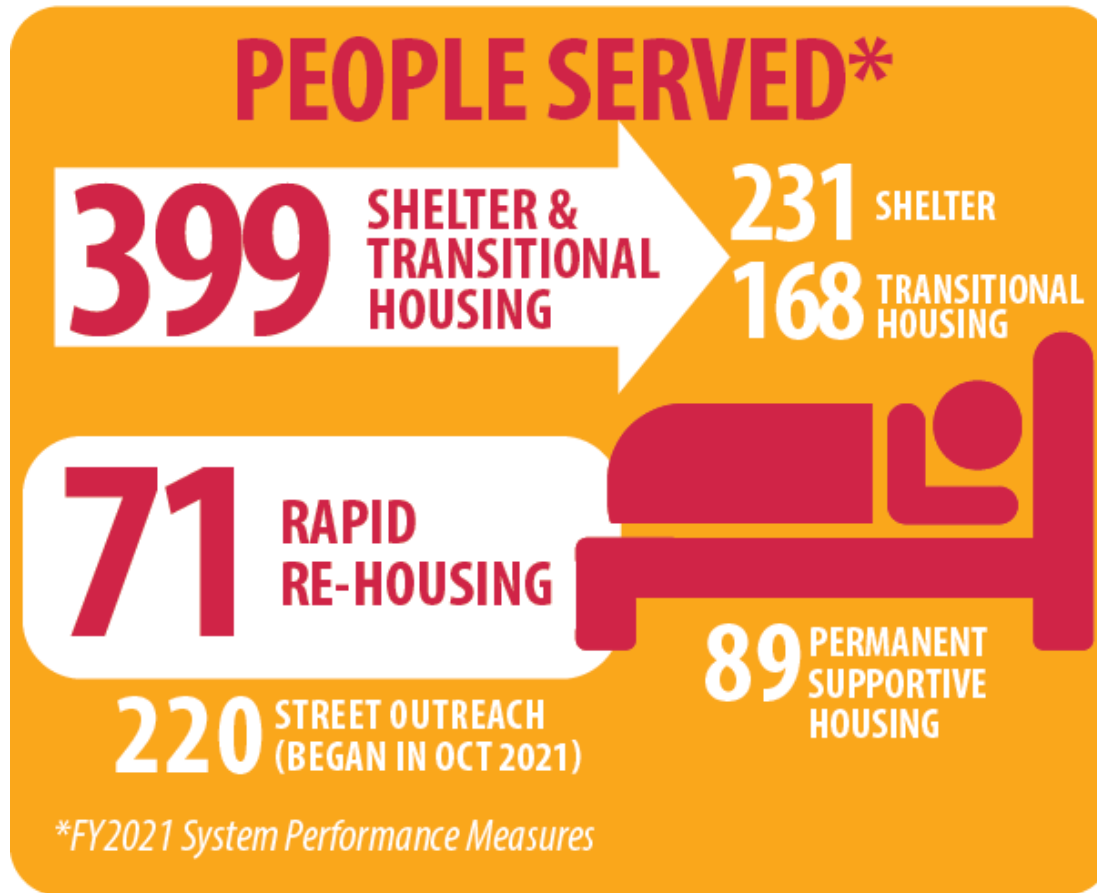




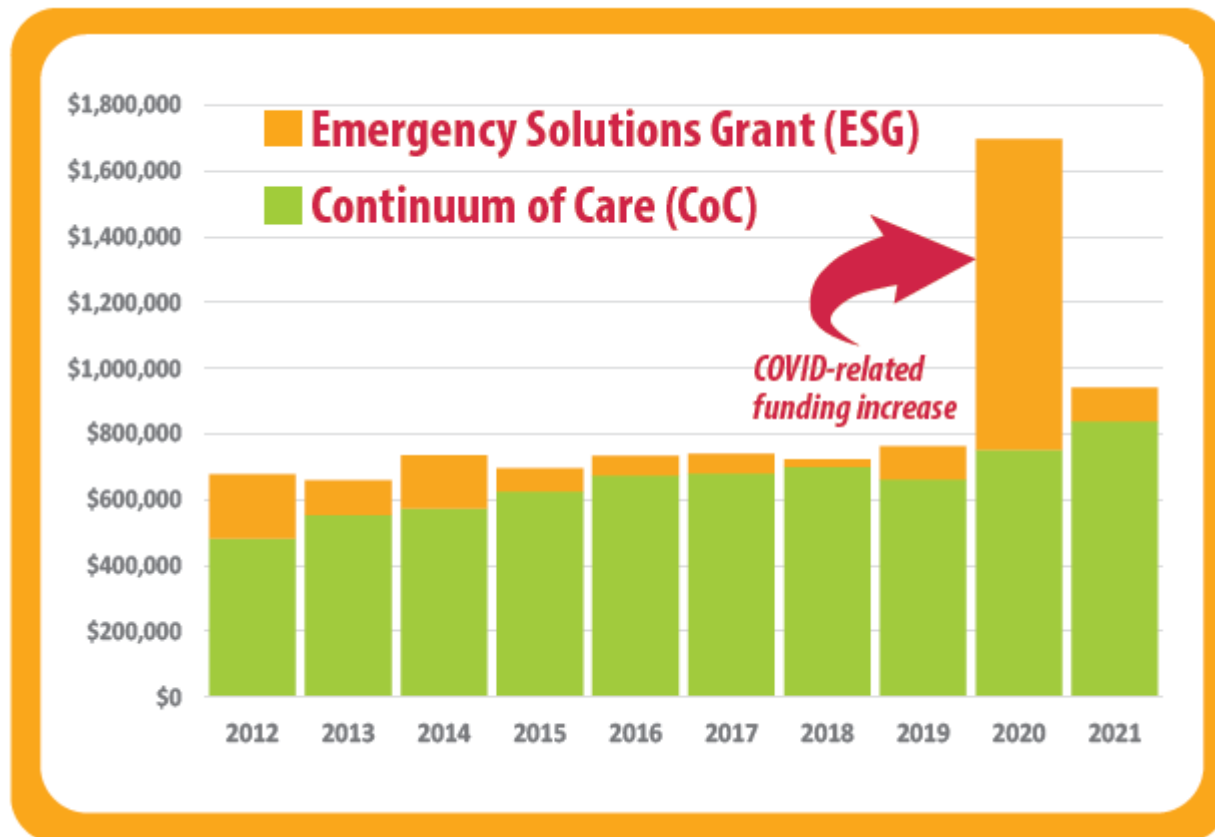

\$941,362 in federal funding for 2021, \$12.9 million since 2005



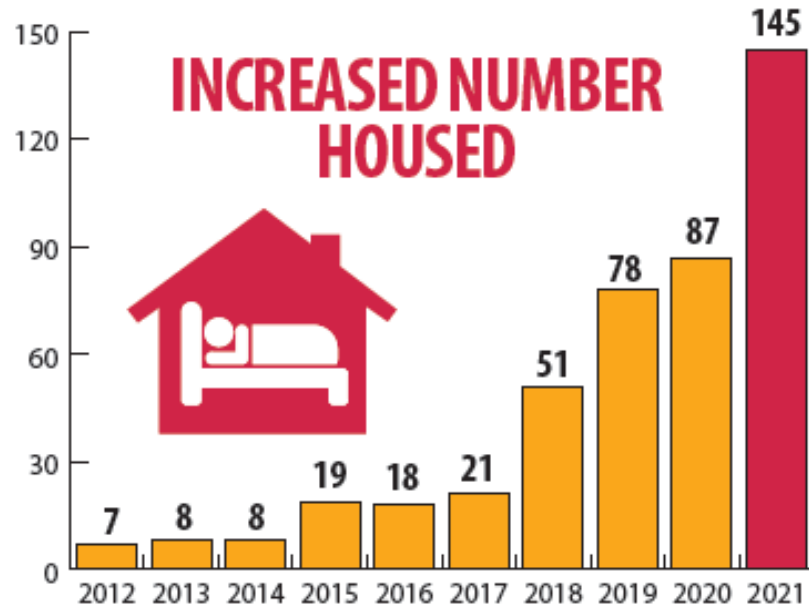

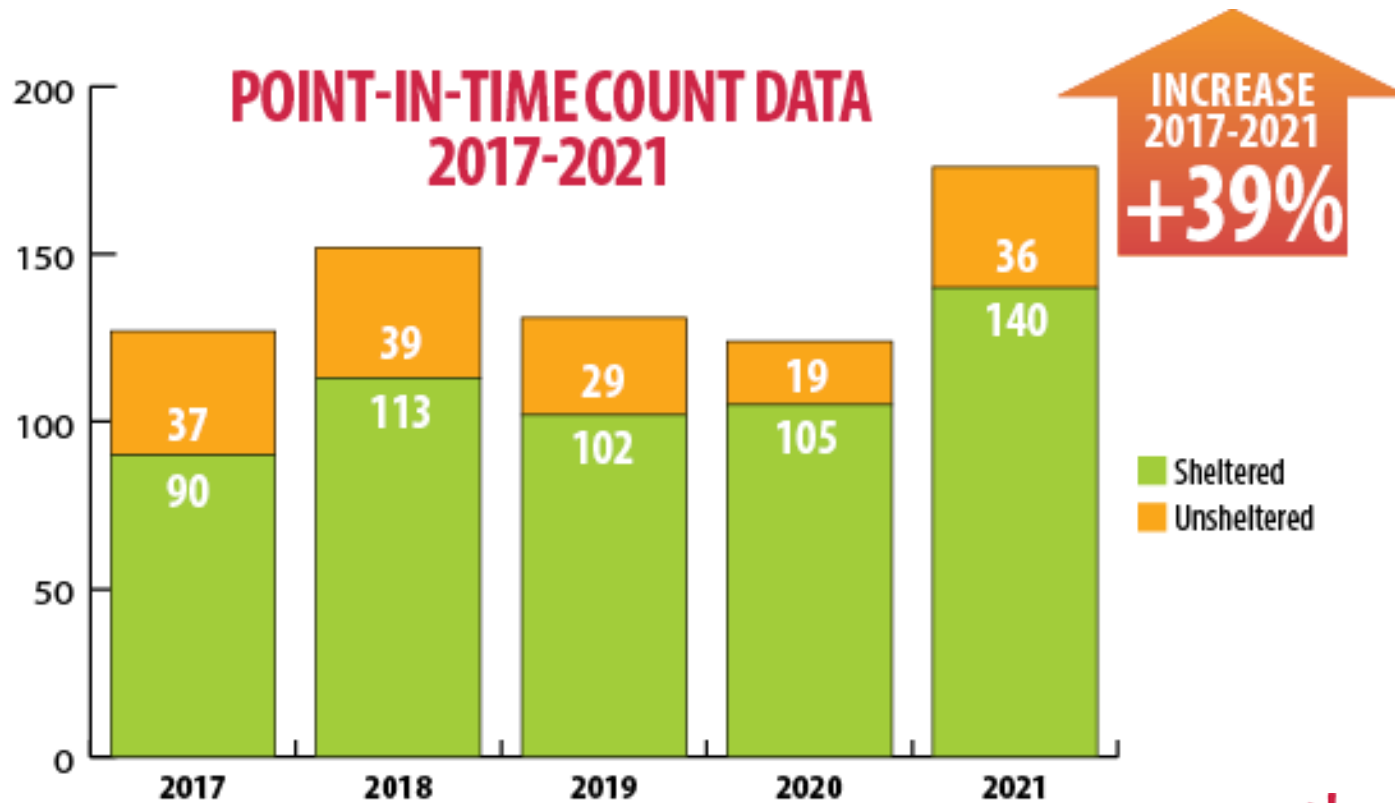

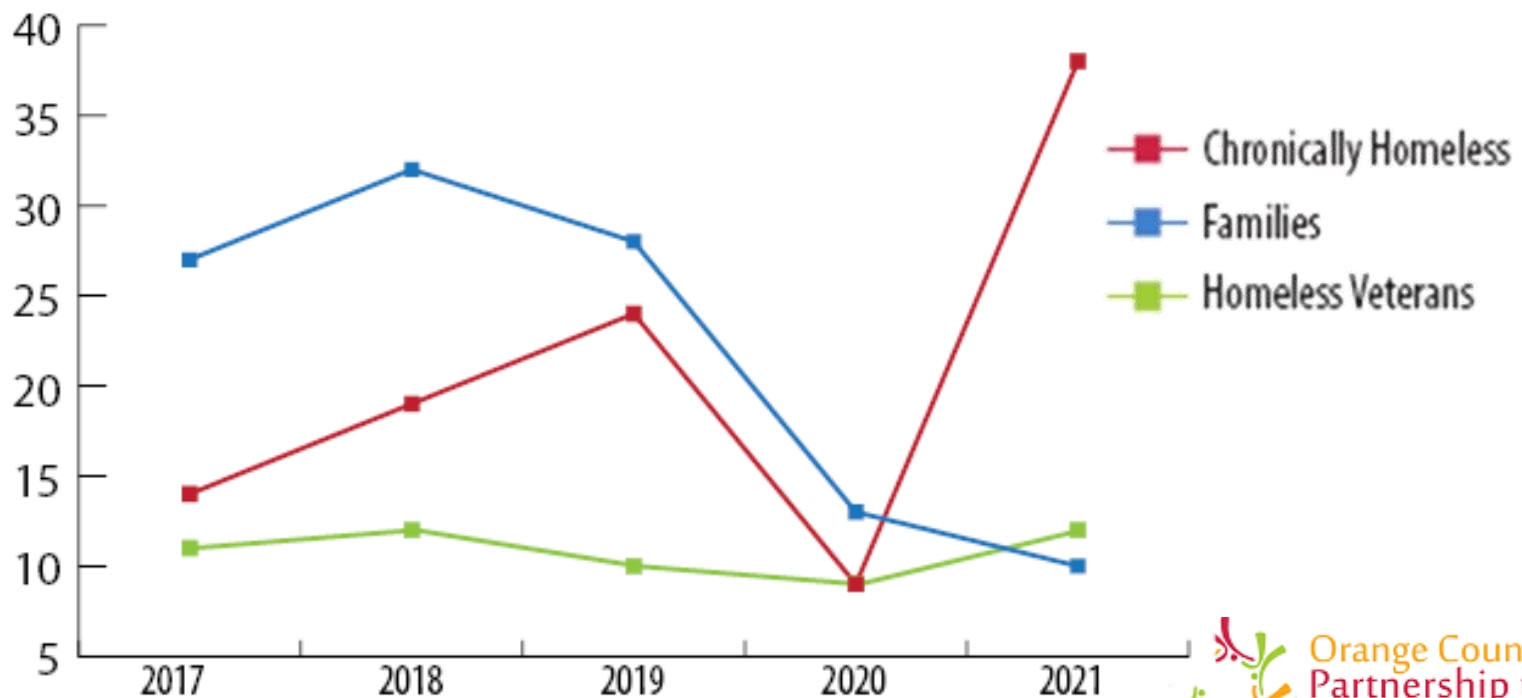


Orange County Point-in-Time (PIT) count numbers increased significantly

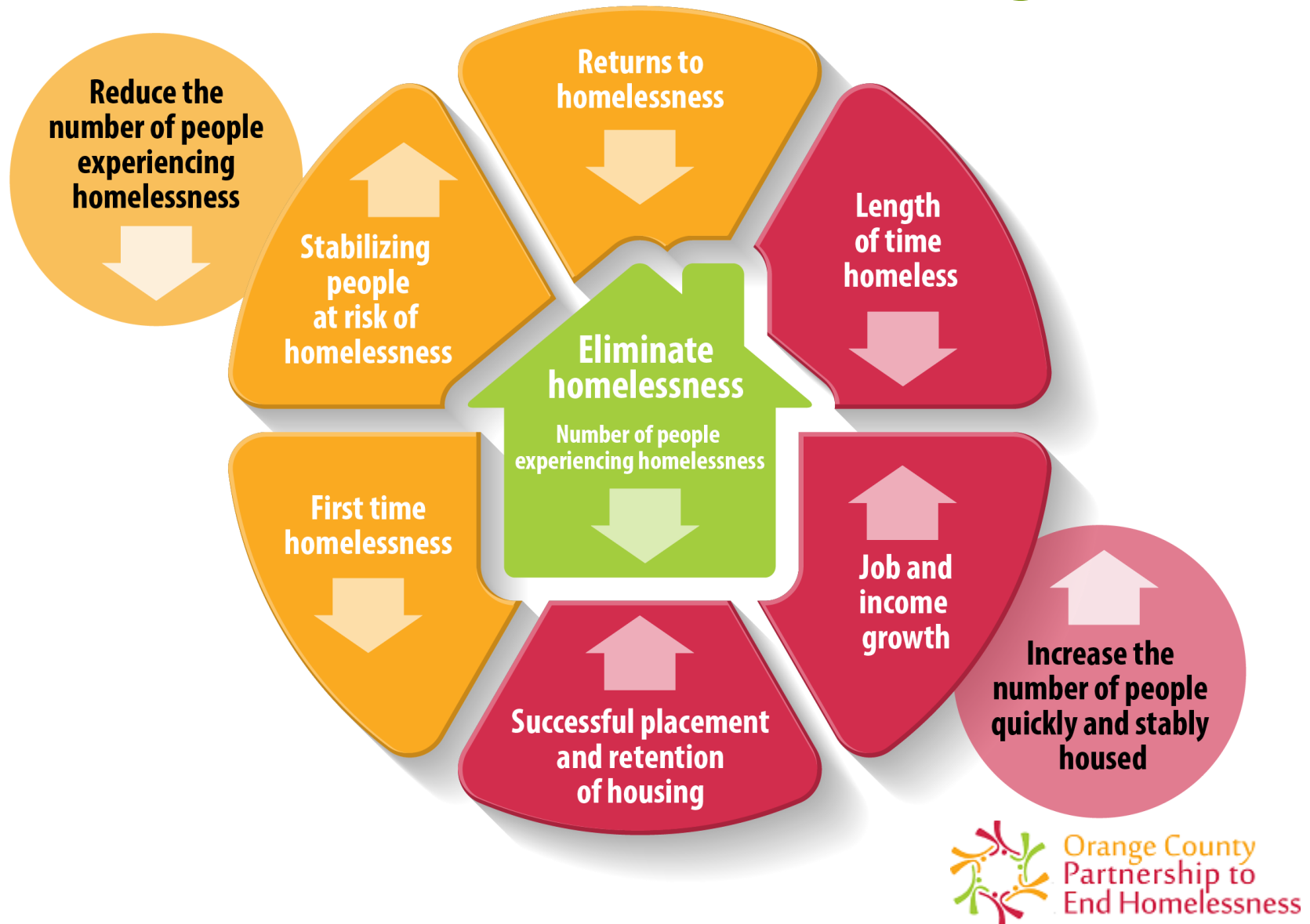


Subpopulations are seeing different outcomes

- Most chronic homeless identified since 2010

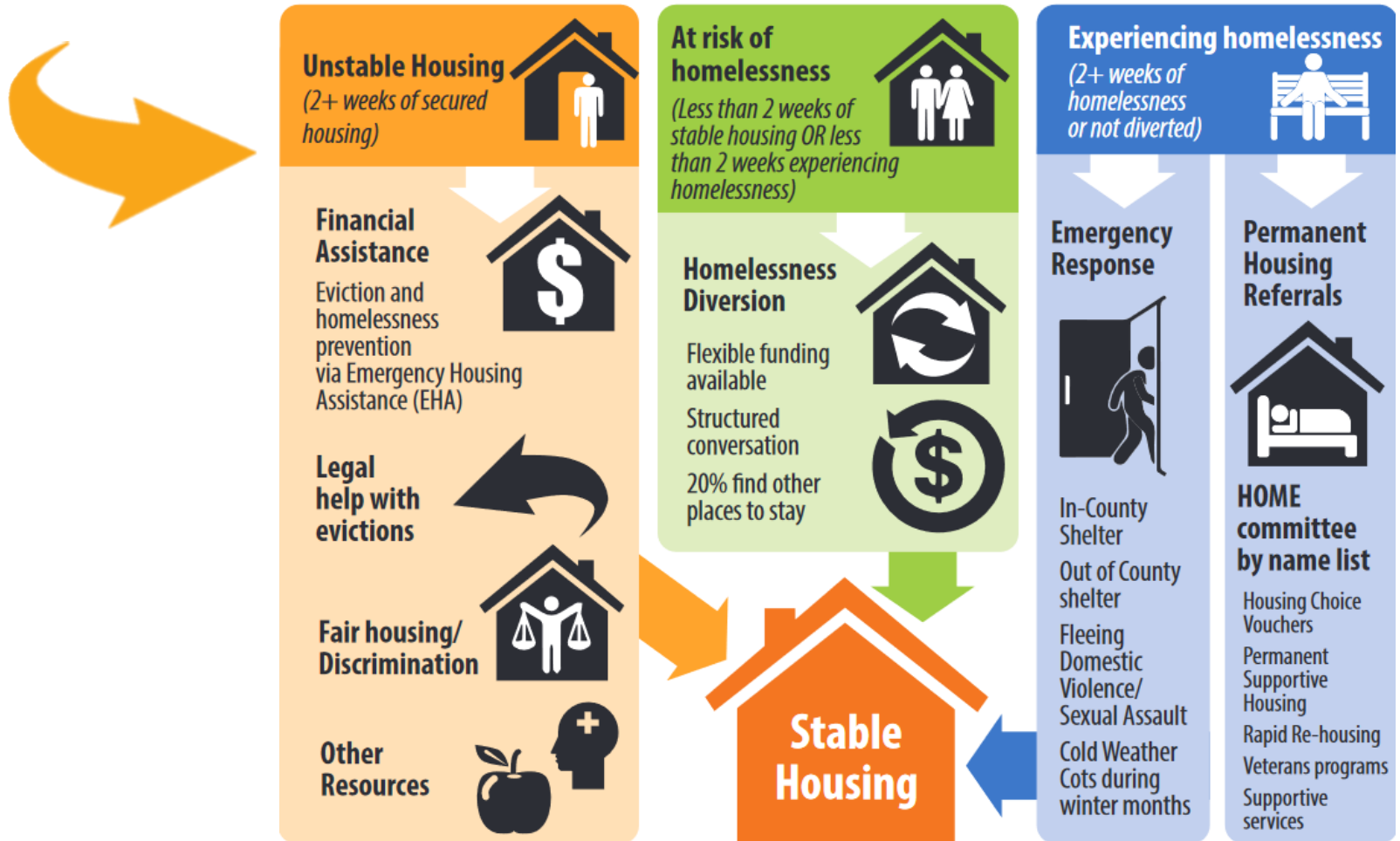


How is the System of Care doing?

We can end homelessness by filling the 15 homeless system gaps



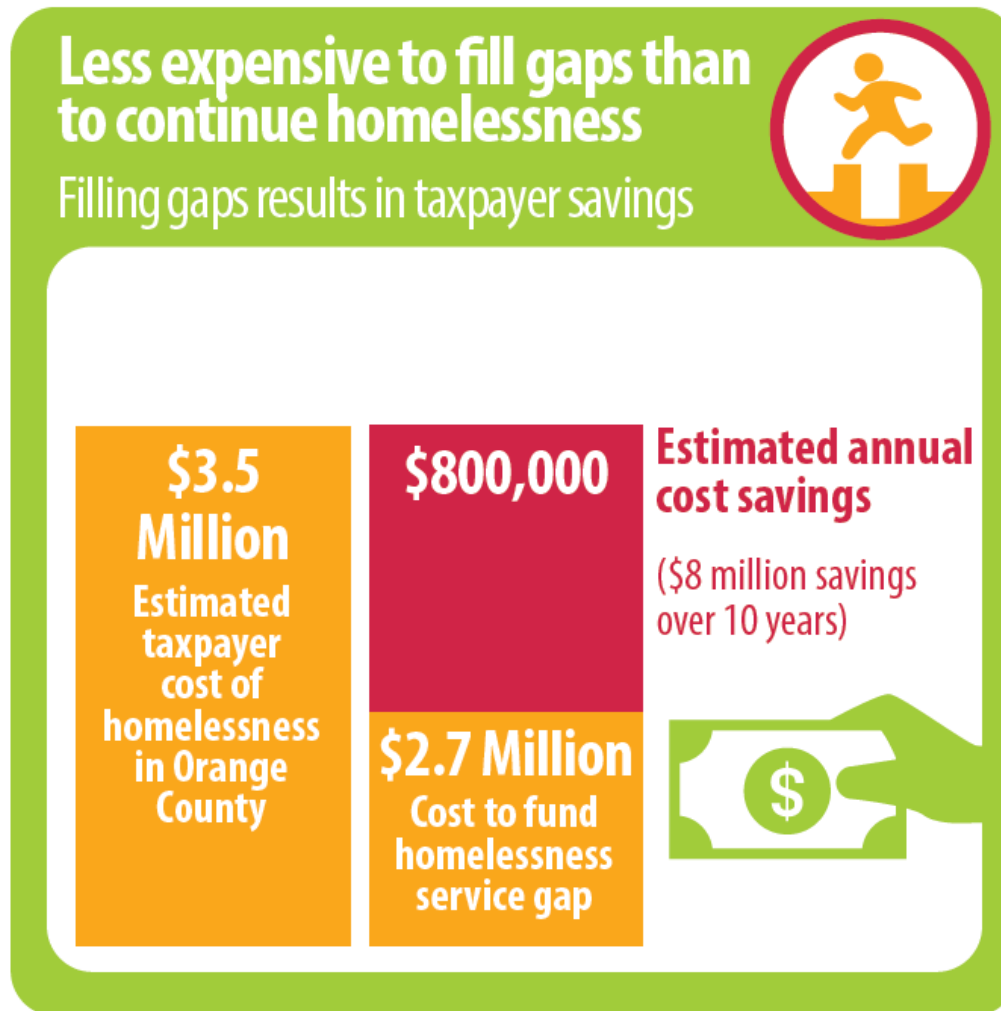
We can end homelessness by closing the 15 current system gaps.

An additional \$2.7 million needed annually for gap funding

It is less expensive to fill gaps than to continue homelessness
