Overview: Staff will present an update on American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) applications from Community Partners who have applied for the \$1 million identified by the Council for this purpose.

- 31 applications are eligible based on pre-determined criteria, ARPA, and State of North Carolina conditions.
- Peoples Academy graduate volunteers and Town staff reviewed each application and assigned scores in ten categories.
- Scoring categories include eligibility, equity, general merit, connections within the community, and how the recipient will measure success.




