We have \$50 million in debt capacity, without raising taxes.

We can put a bond referendum on the ballot this year or next.

We need clear direction from you on projects and timing ASAP.

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For affordable housing, there are multiple funding sources.

- Dedicated "Penny for Affordable Housing"
- Community Partners
- Federal funding
- Revolving Loan Fund
- Bonds

For large capital projects, bonds are often the best (or only) funding source.

- Town facilities (i.e. Fire stations, Parks & Rec Admin Bldg, etc)
- Major infrastructure (Greenways, sidepaths, etc)
- Fire trucks (unless we establish a "Penny for")

Q & A

How does the debt fund operate?

- Established in FY 2009
- Portion of tax rate dedicated to debt service
- Used to pay existing debt service and to build up capacity to pay future debt service
- Dedicated resource to keep from temptation to repurpose dollars



Can we borrow more than \$50.5 million?

- We have capacity for \$50.5 million without raising taxes
- We have capacity for an additional \$27 million, but we would have to raise taxes to borrow this amount.
- At the retreat, BMD
 Director **recommended not using** additional capacity to allow for future opportunities



If 2024 referendum approved, when will money be available?

For a \$44 million referendum, we would **estimate** 3 issuances:

- Approx. \$13-15 million in 2025
- Approx. \$13-15 million in 2027
- Approx. \$13-15 million in 2029/2030

How do staff identify and plan for capital projects?

- Ongoing assessments (streets, facilities, etc)
- Strategic plans (Fire, Parks and Rec, etc)
- Council and community interests (splash pad, greenways, etc)
