Filtering Software Requirements

- Default to minimum filtering
- Clearly configurable
- Simple to quickly override
- Easy to administer
- Useful reports

10 identical searches for information related to health, wellbeing, and sexual identity

- Nudism videos
- "How do I know if I'm trans?"
- "I think I might be bi"
- "What do normal boobs look like?"

Policy Details

- Filter on public computers only
- No filter on staff computers
- No filter on users' devices
- No filter on WiFi

Policy Details

- Filter blocks Obscenity as defined by Miller v. California (1973)
- Filter blocks Child pornography as defined by 18 U.S.C. 2256
- Filter blocks "inappropriate matter" as defined locally

Policy Details

- Public computers will have signage stating that a filter is in place
- Staff will immediately remove the filter upon request by an adult

RECOMMENDATION

That the Council approve 2022-06-08/ R-12, authorizing the Town Manager to revise the library's Internet Use Policy and install an internet filtering device that restricts access to pornographic images on library-owned public computers.
