

#### Research Process


- Gathered and analyzed data on youth
  - 14 focus group discussions with 180 youth in Fall 2018
  - Secondary data (e.g. American Community Survey, etc.)
- Convened youth-serving organizations



Focus group set-up


# Chapel Hill Youth Demographics

#### Chapel Hill youth are diverse.




# Inequities exist in educational achievement and attainment.

2016-'17 College and Career Readiness in Chapel Hill/Carrboro high schools




2017-'18 Graduation rates among Chapel Hill/Carrboro high schools

#### Mental Health




1 in 4 high school

Chapel Hill & Carrboro students felt sad or hopeless enough for 2 weeks or more and stopped usual activities





#### What are the sections of the focus groups?

#### Section 1: My World

- Participants share the places, activities, people, wishes, and challenges in their lives
- To understand the lives of Chapel Hill youth



#### What are the sections of the focus groups?

#### Section 2: Chapel Hill Photos

- Participants react to photos of various Chapel Hill locations
- To understand what youth do and do not like about various locations



#### What are the sections of the focus groups?

#### Section 3: Question Storming

 Participants tell us what questions Chapel Hill should be asking them



#### Who did we target?

 A diverse group of youth with a focus on minority populations

#### Who did we reach?

- 180 middle and high school aged Chapel Hill residents
- ~30 youth focused organizations attended convening

#### I want to...


- Do well in school

#### Obstacles in my way...

- Too little time/busy
- Money
- School work and college prep
- Mental health anxiety, depression, disorders
- Pressure
- Age
- Spaces that feel unwelcoming

#### Focus group findings

- Teens react differently to places in Chapel Hill
  - Positive: Franklin Street, outdoor spaces, University Place, Chapel Hill Transit, Halloween on Franklin
  - No reaction: The Corner Teen Center, Church
  - Negative: Silent Sam



#### Focus group findings

Questions youth identified that the Town should ask:

- Society and cultural issues
  - How do you feel about gun violence?
- General support and resource needs
  - What resources/support do you need that you do not have now?
- Town specific items
  - How can we build unity between diverse communities within Chapel Hill?
- Personal life
  - What do you like?

### Key Themes

- Safe and inclusive spaces
- Busy schedules and pressures to succeed
- Discrimination impacts youths' lived experiences
- Youth face mental health challenges

#### Proposed Next Steps

- Identify strategies to make existing spaces be safe and inclusive for youth
- Continue conversations with the community youth, parents, and community partners
- Continue Town cross-departmental collaboration and communication
