Pursuant to State Statute 106A-388(e)(2), members of these boards "shall not participate in or vote on any quasi-judicial matter in a manner that would violate affected persons' constitutional rights to an impartial decision maker. Impermissible violations of due process include, but are not limited to, a member having a fixed opinion prior to hearing the matter that is not susceptible to change, undisclosed ex parte communications, a close familial, business, or other associational relationship with an affected person, or a financial interest in the outcome of the matter." Any member who violates these Ethics Guidelines may be subject to removal from the board or commission. If the advisory board or commission member believes he/she has a conflict of interest then that member should ask the advisory board or commission to be recused from voting. The advisory board or commission should then vote on the question on whether or not to excuse the member making the request. I am serving my third year on the Parks, Greenways, and Recreation Commission, and my second year as chair. In 2017, I served as a commission representative on the American Legion Task Force. I am reapplying to the commission so I can continue working on priorities that are important to the Parks and Recreation Department and the Town. I would like to mention three of them in this application. First, I am an advocate for free and reduced cost recreational opportunities that are available to the public. As we strive to make Chapel Hill an affordable place to live, we have to make sure it is also an affordable place to exercise, play, and connect with nature. In this role I learned what it means to work with a city parks and recreation department, and how to engage with a community that often presented varied and conflicting ideas for what should be done with the park. Learning how to work with people who are passionate on an issue is a skill that commission members need in Chapel Hill and one that I have learned over the last three years. I was also a board member of Baltimore Green Space, a community land trust. There are thousands of vacant private lots in Baltimore, many of which house community gardens. We developed policy with the City to place vacant lots used by community groups into trust to be remain public land.
