Recommendation

That the Council consider establishing the Town of Chapel Hill Program for Criminal Justice Debt.



OVERVIEW

- . Court fees and costs have a disparate impact on the poor.
- Fines/fees create barriers to community members seeking to reintegrate into the community.
- As African-Americans are disproportionately represented in the criminal justice system due to historic and structural racism, this is a racial equity issue.

Filling a Gap

- Pre-trial: Orange County Bail/Bond Justice Project will assist people with bail and pretrial incarceration.
- Trial: Judges have discretion to waive or remit fees, fines, and costs.
- Post-conviction: Driver's License Restoration Program assists people who are unable to pay court costs related to traffic-related violations.
- Re-entry: Local Reentry Council assists formerly-incarcerated individuals with transportation, housing, employment training, work-related supplies, and childcare.



Program Benefits

- Provides help to eligible low-income individuals who have not been able to receive other available debt relief opportunities.
- By recognizing this important social justice issue, the Town will be a model for other municipalities.
- Fills a gap that other efforts are not able to address.
- Will collect and document the level of need within Chapel Hill.
- Will enhance and offer information on other efforts that support our residents as they seek to overcome barriers and seek stability.



Program Overview

- . Provides criminal justice-related relief to indigent members of our community who are taking steps to successfully reintegrate but whose ability to do so is hampered by debt.
- Initial request is for \$20,000 for a 1-year pilot program with a 6-month report to Council.
- The Crisis Unit will administer the program, establish procedures and application materials, screen applications for eligibility, and facilitate Advisory Committee meetings.
- If Council approves, Crisis Unit staff could start immediately.



Program Eligibility Criteria

Resident of Chapel Hill

Meets court indigency standards

Not currently incarcerated

Applications limited to once every three years

 Has outstanding criminal justice or traffic debt from Orange County inclusive of deferred prosecutions



Program Eligibility Criteria

- Could be seeking services from CHPD Crisis Unit, CEF, IFC, CJRD or other local service provider (but not required)
- Other avenues for debt relief have already been pursued (e.g. court relief, Driver's License Restoration Program)
- Recipient has demonstrated that he or she is on the road to stability (ex. in treatment, employed, raising children, license restored)
- Assistance will have an immediate impact
- **Program will not be used to relieve debt associated with a violent felony conviction

Advisory Committee Charge & Staff Role

- Advise staff on final eligibility criteria.
- Meet quarterly to review applications and make recommendations on awards after staff have screened applications against eligibility criteria.
- Review program data and make recommendations to Council on future plans.

• Provide information to applicants about other resources for debt relief, where appropriate.

Recommendation

Adopt R-12 to approve initial funds, create a Criminal Justice Debt Program Advisory Committee, and seek a report on the pilot program.
