Bergen Watterson, Town Staff, presented on the University Place Redevelopment - special use permit modification. Watterson provided an overview of the subject property including site details, traffic impact analysis, and process.

Ashley Saulpaugh, Ram Realty Advisors, recapped the project overview, vision & goals, and site plan. Chair Brutz summarized Geoffrey Green's public comment (attached) on parking at University Place.

A motion was made by Vice-Chair Kjemtrup-Lovelace, seconded by Matthews, to recommend approval of the special use permit modification for University Place Redevelopment with the following conditions:

- -Developer coordinate with Chapel Hill Transit to explore additional bus stop(s) within the development.
- -Developer meets with community bicycle advocacy groups to determine ideal bicycle parking locations.
- -Developer install additional traffic calming treatments on the interior roadway network.
- -Developer coordinate with Town Staff to consider pedestrian, bicycle, and non-motorized routes within the development to prioritize safety, directness, and experience for all ages and abilities.

The motion passed. 7-1.

2200 Homestead - TCAB (03.23.21)

Bergen Watterson, Town Staff, presented on 2200 Homestead Mixed-Income Development - conditional zoning permit. Watterson provided an overview of the subject property including site details, traffic impact analysis, and process.

Nate Broman-Fulks, Town Staff, provided background context and long-term affordable housing goals of the Town of Chapel Hill. Wendi Ramsden, Coulter Jewell Thames, PA, presented on the development in general and focused on the connection to broader amenities and pedestrian access within the development. Neal Bench, Chapel Hill Resident, provided public comments.

A motion was made by Hageman, seconded by Juliano, to recommend approval of the conditional zoning permit for 2200 Homestead Mixed-Income Development with the following conditions:

- -Developer coordinate with Chapel Hill Transit on the placement of bus stop(s), ensuring safe and convenient access to bus stops on both sides of Homestead Road, and forecast future demand and capacity of the HS-Route to handle frequency and service hours.
- -Developer ensure retention of connectivity between 2200 Homestead and the newly relocated Hope Gardens.

The motion passed unanimously.

- -Add performance measure to adhere to the North-South Bus Rapid Transit project timeline.
- -Add performance measure to resume pre-pandemic level ridership by 2023.
- -Add performance measure for increased accessibility to bus stops.
- -Add performance measure to reduce pedestrian serious injuries and fatalities to zero by 2025.

A motion was made by Vice-Chair Kjemtrup-Lovelace, seconded by Juliano, to approve the 2020-2025 Board Priorities. The motion passed unanimously.
